	sight and reach of children and pets.	
	☐ Products are kept in their original containers.	
	\square Cleaning products are never mixed together.	
	\square Each person has a list of all their medications, including over the counter products and	
	herbal supplements, to show their doctor and pharmacist. This will help prevent unwanted drug interactions.	
	\square Each person has a plan for keeping their medicines organized and on schedule.	
	\square Expired or unwanted medicines have been safely discarded.	
	\square When taking or giving medicine, turn on the lights, put on your glasses if necessary, and	
	check the 3 RIGHTs:	
	1. Is this the RIGHT product?	
	2. Is it for the RIGHT person?	
	3. Is this the RIGHT dose?	
	\square Carbon monoxide alarms are installed and in good working order.	
	\square The Minnesota Poison Control System's number is visible near every phone and	
	programmed into all cell phones: 1-800-222-1222. Call right away—day or night— if anyone	<u>:</u> :
	 Makes a mistake with medicines. 	
	 Swallows something they should not have swallowed. 	
	 Gets something harmful in their eyes or on their skin. 	
	Breathes a harmful gas or fume.	
\	Call 9-1-1 first if someone has difficulty breathing, seizure, or chest pain.
